vulnerable in significant ways, yet each with important gifts that contribute to the life of the community. There is Fiver, a small runt, but who has powers of foresight that are important in saving the community from disaster. And Pipkin who is small and always needing help; but his need for help becomes an important point of connection within, rather than burden upon, the community. Of course, the book isn't really about rabbits, but about human communities, and the important role that everyone plays.

This Sunday we celebrate our "Young at Heart", our brothers and sisters in our church who are 80+ years old. Most of these friends have been a part of our congregation for years, even decades, and though their roles in the congregation have evolved, and perhaps they are less active than in previous years, their place is no less important.

In my years as minister, I've come to value the important place that the Young at Heart hold within the life and spirit of a congregation. In the into dementia when I became her pastor. There were some Sundays that she wasn't sure why she was in church, and audibly asked her son when they were going home! But once we began to pray the Lord's Prayer, I could hear her voice above all others—though so many other things were lost, the words of that prayer connected with something deep inside of her.

Their support of me, a young pastor still learning his way, was valuable, even when they weren't quite sure where I was headed. And their Christian love for each other supported them through even the most difficult times and losses.

In my years as minister, I've come to value the important place that the Young at Heart hold within the life and spirit of a congregation.

In Baton Rouge, there was Harvey, about whom I've shared with all of you. He was another grandfather figure who took me under his wing. He asked some difficult, sometimes unanswerable questions, about our faith, but even with his questions he was dedicated to being present in church. After COVID lockdowns and months of isolation in his retirement home, he was able to make it back to worship one more time before he passed—he was a living witness to everyone of how important a church community was to him.

And here in Midland, we have so many who serve and love in important ways. This Sunday, as we open the season of holiday celebrations with our first church I served, I remember Zara who was far annual Thanksgiving pot luck meal, make sure you let our Young at Heart know how much they are loved, and how they still influence you in important ways!

Listening more than we speak can also be translated to our prayer life. If your prayer life consists of occasional 45 second praying sessions where you list off what you need from God and no more, then you are missing out in a big way. In a spirit of prayer, God can direct your thoughts and opinions towards viewing situations in your life from a healthy, life-giving perspective.
