

IN THE LAND OF THE LOST

Back in the 70's there was a really bad TV show called the Land of the Lost. I don't remember who acted in it, or

any plot lines other than it was about a family who dropped through a hole in time and ended up in an alternate universe of dinosaurs and dangerous, hissing reptilian humanoids. If any of this raises your curiosity to go to Youtube and find some old episodes, don't bother; I was addicted to TV as a kid, but I don't think that show ever held my attention for more than a few minutes.

But the concept behind the show does ring true in certain respects—how many times have we awakened in a world that seems completely foreign, full of dangers that we can scarcely conceptualize. As our world comes to terms with the ramifications of using Artificial Intelligence, my mind still boggles at all of the hidden dangers that could arise and already have arisen. How do we navigate these troubled waters?

While I don't have an authoritative answer on how to integrate the benefits of Artificial Intelligence into our culture without suffering any drawbacks, I do know that for centuries Christians have had to navigate the troubled waters of changing culture and changing technologies.

Almost 100 years before the invention of television, Soren Kierkegaard, a Danish Christian philosopher, pondered about what would happen if such a device was invented. He said, "Suppose someone invented a convenient little talking tube which could be heard over the whole land. I wonder if the police would not forbid it, fearing that the whole country would become mentally deranged."

100 years after the invention of TV what can we say? TV has been a tremendous blessing, but also the source of any number of "mental derangements" too...(and personally I would add The Land of the Lost among the many, though certainly less dangerous, derangements).

The changes will come, but we are not without instruction. In Ephesians 4, Paul instructs the church.

¹⁴ We must no longer be children, tossed to and fro and blown about by every wind of doctrine by people's trickery, by their craftiness in deceitful scheming; ¹⁵ but speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, ¹⁶ from whom the whole body, joined and knit together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love.



As we navigate the complex times we live in, let us remind ourselves to speak truth, but always in love. And as we continue to grow in Christ, may we be joined together, rather than torn apart, by the love the binds us into Christ's body. As Lent begins, and we reflect on encouraging greater faithfulness in our lives, may these words build us together.

"WHAT DOES DISCERNMENT LOOK LIKE IN YOUR LIFE?"

Discernment is difficult. It is difficult both for the most

devoted Christian you know, and someone who is new to Christianity. Along the entire spectrum, most Christians would agree that discerning God's call and direction in our lives is a hard thing to do.

Would this direction make God proud of me? Does this direction I feel God is calling me in lead with a spirit of love? If the answer is no to either of those questions, then maybe rather than discerning what God could be saying, we are telling God what we feel is important. God does not care. God calls us to love others and build God's Kingdom here on earth through our actions.

It is particular difficult to assess when God could be directing us in a direction, or whether we are simply telling ourselves what we want to hear. Those who find discernment simple conveniently worship a God that agrees with everything they believe.

It is easy to fall into the trap of believing that God's voice matches our beliefs, but in reality that couldn't be further from the truth. God is ready and willing to push us into a direction we could never expect. God did that exact thing in the Bible many times, for example the conversion of Saul to Paul, calling Moses to free the Israelites although Moses himself told God that he wasn't ready.

When we pray I would encourage us to try and do more listening than speaking. I use the word try because that is a difficult thing to do. When we listen for God's guidance it is important to allow God to take our mind in the direction he may be pushing us.

When we pray and our mind wanders a bit, naturally we are going to begin thinking about the situation in the way that God would view the situation. We view the situation in that moment with the pretense of our faith leading the way. For example, we may be struggling with a particular relationship in our life. We take the time to pray for that relationship and while doing so, God moves our heart in a way that is difficult to explain. In that moment we are thinking of that situation through the eyes of God.

God frames that situation through the lens of a loving Christian God aspires us to be. Because we first took the time to reflect rather than acting out of emotion. Then after some time to cool down, we pray, and God guides.

If you are wondering if it is God guiding your heart during a prayer I would ask yourself these questions.

The direction I feel God is calling me to take in this situation, does that direction line up with God's teachings as a whole. I don't mean asking yourself if there is a singular bible verse to back up your opinion. Rather ask yourself, does your perspective look at the situation in the same way that Jesus would.

If the answer is no to either of those questions, then maybe rather than discerning what God could be saying, we are telling God what we feel is important. God does not care. God calls us to love others and build God's Kingdom here on earth through our actions.

Building that Kingdom is growing in our faith. Building that Kingdom is bringing others to build a relationship with God like we have. Building that Kingdom is helping those in need. Building that Kingdom happens when we put our own ambitions aside, so we can follow God with all our heart, soul and might.
